ATHENS

Athens Welcome Center Your Athens' Antebellum Trail Headquarters and location of Classic City Tours, inside the historic Church-Waddel-Brumby House. Open 10-5 pm. 706-353-1801; 280 E. Dougherty St., 30601; athenswelcomecenter.com; www.visitathensga.com.

10:30-11:30 am UGA Historic North Campus Walking Tour, departs from the UGA Arch on East Broad St. at College Ave.

2:00-3:30 pm Athens Heritage Tour, departs from the Athens Welcome Center; begins with a guided tour of the Church-Waddel-Brumby House. *Reservations requested – 706-455-1820; 280 E. Dougherty St., 30601.*

Church-Waddel-Brumby House, c.1820– One of Athens four house museums: the city's oldest residence was home to two UGA presidents. Location of the Athens Welcome Center & Classic City Tours. Open 10-5 pm. – 706-353-1820; 280 E. Dougherty St., 30601.

T.R.R. Cobb House, c. 1830 –Docent-guided tours featuring its history, architecture, and decorative arts, as well as the life of T.R.R. Cobb, co-founder of the UGA Law School, Confederate Brigadier General, and principal author of the Confederate Constitution. - 706-369-3513; 175 Hill St.; 30601.

Taylor-Grady House, c. 1840 – Open for tours and commentary, this Greek Revival house was home to General Robert Taylor and famed journalist, Henry W. Grady. - 706-549-8688; 634 Prince Ave., 30601.

Ware-Lyndon House, c. 1850 – Open for tours and commentary, this impeccably restored Italianate house is furnished with antiques and decorative arts from the Victorian period. Also visit the expansive art galleries of the Lyndon House Arts Center at the rear. – 706-613-3623; 293 Hoyt St.; 30601.

- **Eagle Tavern** – built in the late 1700's, visitors will receive a guided tour of this former Stagecoach stop and tavern – 22 N. Main St, Bldg B

- **Oconee Cultural Arts Foundation** – OCAF will display a national juried exhibit featuring selected works produced by skilled artists from around the country – 34 School St.

- **Ashford Manor Bed & Breakfast** – Take a tour of an 1893 Victorian home with four acres of magnificent gardens - #5 Harden Hill Road

- **Hilltop** – C. 1832. This home with Greek Revival detail features furnishings of American antiques and English porcelains, antique oriental rugs, family pieces, and reproductions as well as an antique oriental candy mould – 543 N. Main St

- **Thomas-Clark-Dennis-Harrison House** – This Victorian home was built in 1902 when the now famous road was simply called “the Avenue” – 407 N. Madison Ave

MILLEDGEVILLE

- **Old Governor’s Mansion** – This National Historic Landmark was claimed by Sherman in the infamous “March to the Sea” and served as home to GA’s governors until 1868 when the capital was moved to Atlanta. Tours hourly – 120 S. Clarke St

- **Georgia’s Old State Capital Museum** – Experience Civil War history in the building where GA legislators voted to secede from the Union – 201 E. Greene St.

- **Lockerly Hall** – Explore a real Southern plantation! This Greek Revival home is the centerpiece of Lockerly Arboretum; famous for its lily pads – 1534 Irwinton Hwy.

- **Historic Trolley Tour** – This guided tour includes rotating visits historical locations as well as a driving tour through the Antebellum Capital. Tour is ONLY available at 10am – 200 W. Hancock St.

GRAY/OLD CLINTON

- **Lockett-Hamilton House** – c. 1830 home located in Old Clinton, “the town that time forgot” -

- **Griswoldville Battlesite** – Relive the Battle of Griswoldville which happened on Nov 22, 1864 and was the only major infantry battle opposing Gen. Sherman's March to the Sea – 10 miles east of Macon via US 80

MACON

- **Hay House** - Aptly named the "Palace of the South," this is a must-see in Macon. Featuring luxuries far ahead of its time, this 1859 mansion was featured on A&E's America's Castles. Guided tours of 2 floors will be held hourly with the last tour at 3pm – 934 Georgia Avenue

- **Sidney Lanier Cottage** – Be greeted by the region’s top historical re-enactor, in his authentic 1840’s costume, completely transformed into young Sidney! Visitors will be regaled with tales from the life of one of the South’s most beloved poets and musicians – 935 High St

- **Riverside Cemetery Tours** – History, art and architecture live in this 19th century rural garden cemetery. Guided tours at 2pm only; Self-guided tours 8:30-4:30 – 1301 Riverside Drive

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GRAY/OLD CLINTON

- **Griswoldville Battlesite** – Relive the Battle of Griswoldville which happened on Nov 22, 1864 and was the only major infantry battle opposing Gen. Sherman's March to the Sea – 10 miles east of Macon via US 80
- **Old Clinton War Days** - Camp 1399 and various reenactment groups annually participate in "Old Clinton War Days" featuring the Battle of Sunshine Church & Griswoldville Battle Reenactments – 1 mile south of Gray on US 129
- **McCarthy-Pope House** – C. 1809, this Piedmont Plain style home is the oldest existing structure in the Old Clinton Historic District. Guided tours on the hour – 413 Pulaski St

MACON

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- **Cannonball House** – In addition to the regular tours, Jennifer O’Kelley will present the “Georgia Suitcase’ program, featuring basement found treasures of letters revealing extraordinary stories of a Macon family – 856 Mulberry St

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SATURDAY APRIL 30

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2:00-3:30 pm - Oconee Hill Cemetery Walking Tour. Nestled behind UGA’s Sanford Stadium, this historic cemetery encompasses 100 acres in one of the most scenic landscapes in North Georgia. Departs from the Oconee Hill Cemetery Sexton's House at 297 Cemetery St., 30602; *Reservations requested: 706-353-1820.*

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EATONTON

- **Thomas-Clark-Dennis-Harrison House** – This Victorian home was built in 1902 when the now famous road was simply called “the Avenue” – 407 N. Madison Ave

- **Ezell-Tatum House** – A formal garden and period furniture complete the graceful appearance of the Queen Anne Victorian, built in 1886 – 300 N. Madison Ave.

- **Jenkins Hall** – This rambling home began as a two-bedroom cottage in 1810 and retains its original hardwood floors. A two-over-two house was later built in front of the cottage and in about 1898 a kitchen and breezeway were added. In the mid-1900's, Lollie Jenkins lived in the house and became the first woman to own and run a dairy by herself. – 451 Oconee Springs Road (approximately 2 miles from the Courthouse).

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- **McCarthy-Pope House** – C. 1809, this Piedmont Plain style home is the oldest existing structure in the Old Clinton Historic District. Guided tours on the hour – 413 Pulaski St
- **Clinton UMC Memorial Service** – At twilight, experience a Memorial Service in which a lighted candle is held over the grave of each Confederate Soldier. At the end of the service roll is called and as each name is softly spoken, the candle for that soldier is blown out. *Tour at 4pm only and Memorial service at 7pm* – Corner of Gordon & Jefferson St in Gray

MACON

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EATONTON

- **Ezell-Tatum House** – A formal garden and period furniture complete the graceful appearance of the Queen Anne Victorian, built in 1886 – 300 N. Madison Ave.

- **Plaza Arts Center** – The classic film, *Gone with the Wind*, will be shown at 3pm only at the Plaza Arts Center in downtown Eatonton – 305 N. Madison Ave

- **Jenkins Hall** – This rambling home began as a two-bedroom cottage in 1810 and retains its original hardwood floors. A two-over-two house was later built in front of the cottage and in about 1898 a kitchen and breezeway were added. In the mid-1900's, Lollie Jenkins lived in the house and became the first woman to own and run a dairy by herself. – 451 Oconee Springs Road (approximately 2 miles from the Courthouse)
