- **Ezell-Tatum House** – A formal garden and period furniture complete the graceful appearance of the Queen Anne Victorian built in 1886 – 300 N. Madison Ave

- **Napier-Reid-Rainey-Stubbs-Eagle Tavern (Bronson House)** – Originally a Piedmont Plain house built in 1816-1822, the home was remodeled in 1846 to Greek Revival – 114 N. Madison Ave

- **Thomas-Clark-Dennis-Harrison House** – This Victorian home was built in 1902 when the now famous road was simply called “the Avenue” – 407 N. Madison Ave

- **Adams-Young-Rivers Home**, c.1852 - This Greek Revival cottage was built in 1852 by Dr. Robert Adams. He incorporated elements from a smaller home on this lot and the interior of much of the house is original. The property is currently being renovated - 103 W. Sumter St.
